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Chapter 01

Institutional Profile/ Executive Summary

1.1 Vision

An advanced society that women and children enjoy the full benefits and opportunities of development fairly and equally.

1.2 Mission

Formulate and execute policies, projects and programs for providing and enhancing legal, institutional and human resource services for the economic empowerment, and social protection of women and children considering national priorities and requirements along with international standards.

1.3 Introduction, Subjects and Functions

The Ministry of Women and Child Affairs was established by the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2412/08 dated 25.11.2024 of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

The main functions and tasks of the Ministry are as follows.

1. Formulation, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of policies, strategies, programs and projects, in relation to the subjects of Women and Child Affairs and those subjects that come under the purview of Departments, Statutory Institutions and Public Corporations working under the scope based on the national policies implemented by the government.
2. Provision of public services under the purview of the Ministry in an efficient and people friendly manner.
3. Reforming all systems and procedures using modern management techniques and technology, thus ensuring that the functions of the Ministry are fulfilled while eliminating corruption and waste.
4. Implementation of Women's Charter.
5. Formulation and implementation of strategies to enhance women's participation and representation in decision making in state affairs and in the political field.
6. Adoption of necessary measures for the empowerment of women affected by conflicts and poverty.
7. Strengthening and implementation of laws and policies for the prevention of women and child abuse.
8. Amending existing laws and formulating and implementing new laws and policies to prevent discrimination against women on the basis of sex and gender.
9. Formulation and implementation of policies and programs for the empowerment of women headed households.
10. Accomplishment of Sustainable Development Goals in relation to women and child affairs
11. Introducing gradual legal and policy reforms to bring a minimum 50% of women's representation in political structures.
12. Combating period poverty by providing necessary tax reliefs, financial and other support.
13. Reducing the burden of unpaid care work on women.
14. Formulation of policies and programs on early childhood protection and development aimed at bringing up physically and mentally healthy children.
15. Development and implementation of programs and projects in line with international standards to protect the rights of vulnerable children.
16. Implementation of the Children's Charter.
17. Regulating Child Care Centers.
18. Implementation of the Sevana Sarana Foster-Parent Scheme.
19. Providing financial assistance for developing the skills of exceptionally talented children.

20. Revising discriminatory laws that oppress women and children.
21. All other subjects that come under the following Institutions.
22. Supervision of those Institutions.

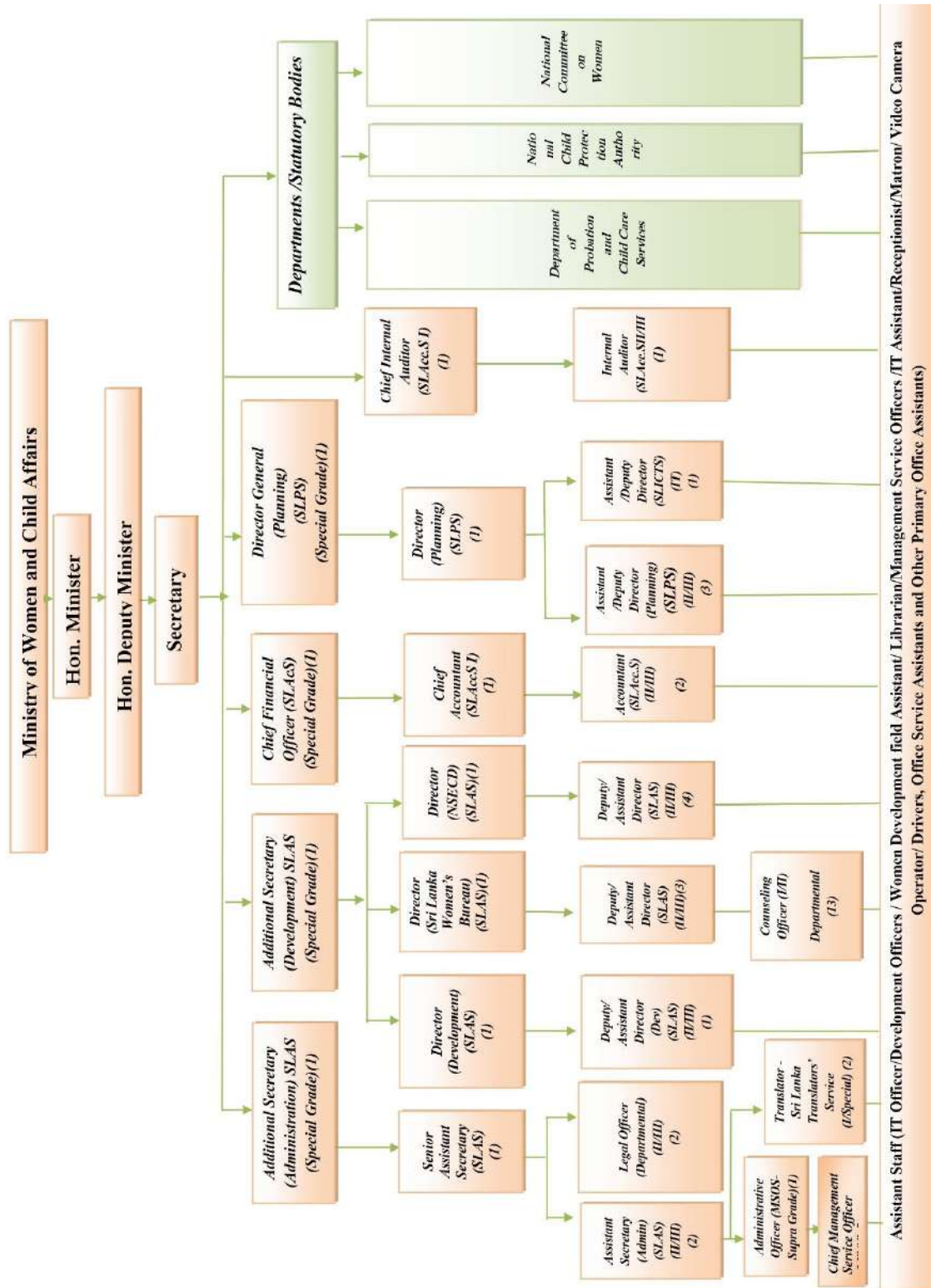

1.5 Departments/ Institutions and Divisions under the Ministry

Administration Division

Introduction

For the management of human resources and physical resources of the Ministry and its affiliated institutions, the Administration Division functions in accordance with the regulations and circulars of the institution. The Administration Division provides efficient service to institutions implementing development programs by performing the following functions.

Key Functions

The key functions include conducting institutional and administrative activities related to the staff of the Ministry and all institutions under the Ministry, developing human resource skills through providing local and foreign training, contributing to policy formulation by properly submitting Cabinet Memoranda, Bills, etc. related to the scope of the Ministry, providing necessary human resources, implementing human resource development programs, dealing with public grievances, answering parliamentary questions, coordinating all parliamentary affairs including parliamentary advisory committee activities, adjournment motions and standing orders, making necessary arrangements to submit the annual reports of the Department of Probation and Child Care Services and the National Child Protection Authority for the approval of Parliament, coordinating the activities of the Presidential Secretariat, Prime Minister's Office and the Office of the Cabinet of Ministers, and dealing with the Right to Information Act.

Development Division

Introduction

It is the main division with primary responsibility for formulating policies and legislation and implementing national-level development programs of the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs. Coordination of programs implemented by institutions under the Ministry, coordination of United Nations affiliated institutions related to women and children, coordination of other foreign and local institutions, coordination of national level programs and evaluations are also carried out. Furthermore, it is a primary responsibility to prepare updated reports related to women and child development for international conventions, agreements, etc.

Key Functions

Key functions are coordinating the programs implemented by the affiliated institutions of the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs, which is the main stakeholder of the government mechanism that implements the various national and internationally recognized conventions and statutes that Sri Lanka is bound by, coordinating the United Nations affiliated institutions and foreign as well as local institutions, coordinating national level programs, follow-up as well as securing and promoting the rights of women and children, preparation of policies and laws and national level action plans that facilitate ensuring equality and full development.

Accounts Division

Along with making and managing annual allocations, and making payments for operating and development programs, the Accounts Division is entrusted with maintaining public accounts with transparency and financial discipline as per the powers assigned to the Chief Accounting Officer by the Financial Regulations.

In addition to carrying out the accounting procedure related to the Ministry and the entire procurement process, the accounts of the departments, statutory bodies and boards are also monitored.

Internal Audit Division

To maintain the quality and efficiency of the services and programs carried out by the Ministry, the financial audit, performance audit, management audit, system control audit and the audit based on the risk areas are carried out to provide guidance to achieve the desired goals of the institution.

Planning and Information Technology Division

Introduction

Key functions are planning, monitoring, follow-up and systematic maintenance of the information and communication technology practices of the Ministry in order to deliver the Ministry's services more effectively and efficiently in the women and child affairs sector and operating the information technology affairs of the Ministry in accordance with the e-government policy and all relevant state technical policies.

Key Functions

The main functions are to prepare annual action plans by gathering information from all division/ departments/ institutions of the Ministry, to prepare national plans related to the women and child sector and to provide necessary contributions, to report progress of action plans, to maintain district coordination processes from the national level to the divisional level, to operate and evaluate development programs of the Ministry, and to submit annual budget estimates and new project proposals related to the development programs. Preparing the Annual Performance Report of the Ministry and submitting for the Parliament.

Department of Probation and Child Care Services

Introduction

The Department of Probation and Child Care Services is the national institution that works in line with national policies and international standards and legal provisions to provide equal opportunities and ensuring the rights of all children with specific attention to orphaned, abandoned and destitute children and children in conflict with the law.

Key Functions

The Department of Probation and Child Care Services functions with the mission of ensuring the rights of all children and providing them equal opportunities in line with national policies and international standards with specific attention to orphaned, abandoned and destitute children and children in conflict with the law.

Coordinating and supporting the functions of Provincial Probation and Child Care Services Departments, providing guidance when necessary for various institutions operating under the subject of Probation, preparing national policies/ standards, implementing the alternative care policy, support for amending laws related to children and making new laws are the main activities carried out under the subject of probation.

Under the subject of child protection, implementing the Children's Charter, establishing and strengthening social structures for child protection, working together with active non-governmental organizations throughout the island and international non-governmental organizations for child protection are done through Child Right Promotion Officers and Child Right Promotion Assistants attached to District and Divisional Secretariats.

National Secretariat for Early Childhood Development

Introduction

The Children's Secretariat was established in 1979 under the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs, and its name was amended as the National Secretariat for Early Childhood Development in 2020 reflecting the objectives, vision, mission and functions of the institution.

The period from conception to the age of 5 is considered a child's early childhood. Accordingly, the National Secretariat for Early Childhood Development functions with a mission for creating a physically, psychosocially and cognitively developed generation of Sri Lankan children in the early childhood as the national focal institution to ensure the holistic development of Sri Lankan children in early childhood through formulation, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of policies and programs.

Key Functions

Functioning as the focal institution for formulating, implementing and monitoring national policy projects/programs on early childhood care and development, coordinating and networking Early Childhood Development Programs conducted by government, non-government organizations and the private sector, conducting research, data collection and formulation of programs related to Early Childhood Care and Development, formulation and implementation of training programs related to the overall development of Early Childhood of Children and the development of Human Resources related to the Early Childhood Development.

National Child Protection Authority

Introduction

The National Child Protection Authority was established by the National Child Protection Authority Act No. 50 of 1998 for the purpose of formulating a national policy to prevent child abuse, to protect and provide treatment to children who have been subjected to such abuse, and to coordinate and regulate actions against all forms of child abuse.

When implementing the National Development Action Plan 2025 of the National Child Protection Authority, it was classified into capital expenditure and recurrent expenditure, at the request of the Department of National Budget of the Ministry of Finance.

Key Functions

Institution entrusted with a broad mandate in accordance with the said National Child Protection Authority Act.

To develop legal, administrative or other reforms necessary for the effective implementation of the national policy on child protection, to develop and maintain a national database on violence against children, to receive complaints of child abuse from the public, which includes investigating, operating and maintaining, supervising the process of child abuse cases involving children and providing assistance, supervision and follow-up to children in conflict with the law, and to develop and monitor minimum standards for the provision of child protection services and facilities. Also, the main functions include developing and conducting national programs with the objectives of preventing child abuse and responding to child victims of abuse for the best interests of the child, educating children, youth, professionals and the public, providing information and education, and conduct stakeholder meetings, workshops, discussions and forums on child protection and child development to promote child abuse prevention methods and child protection knowledge to ensure the safety of children from all forms of abuse.

Officers have been attached at the District and Divisional Secretariat levels to perform the functions of the Authority. They attend to tasks assigned by the Authority as well as to matters that are directly reported to them.

Women's Bureau of Sri Lanka

Introduction

The main national mechanism to implement projects and programs for the social and economic development of women. It has given top priority to setup stronger network of women organizations for achieving the rights and opportunities in a collective approach.

Key Functions

Identifying, planning, implementing and evaluating programs for socio - economic empowerment of Sri Lankan women and identifying exceptional qualities of women in all age groups and implementing programs to make them stakeholders of total development of the country.

Moreover, implementing programs to alleviate difficulties faced by women owing to the sole reason of their femininity, implementing special programs for the women who confront numerous difficulties due to special social circumstances, implementing programs to upgrade the knowledge, skills and attitudes of the entire women generation to an esteemed level and organizing women in single network ranging from community-based level to national level to enable them to be operative within one organization.

National Committee on Women

Introduction

The National Committee on Women was established on 8th March 1993 to implement and direct the provisions of the Women's Charter. It is the national body that formulates policies and laws for the welfare, care and protection of women.

Key Functions

The key function of the National Committee on Women that established with the aim of creating a violence-free, women-friendly Sri Lankan society that ensures equality is making recommendations and providing assistance for the formulation of policies and legislation that safeguard and promote the rights of Sri Lankan women, ensure equality and contribute to their comprehensive development and stimulating the proper implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of the same. Accordingly, the National Committee on Women operates a complaint center and the 1938 toll-free women's helpline service that provides necessary services 24 hours a day. These services provide legal advice, counseling and refer complainants to relevant institutions and call for reports. Timely follow-up of the complaints received is also a key function of the National Committee on Women.

Chapter 02

Progress and Future Targets

2.1 Strengthening of Legal Mechanism

1. Enforcement of the Women Empowerment Act

This Act, No. 37 of 2024, was passed in Parliament and published as a supplement to Part II of the Gazette of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka on 05th July 2024. In accordance with its provisions, the National Commission on Women was established in the year 2025.



2. Preparation of Gender Budgeting Act

The concept paper on the preparation of the Gender Budgeting Act, has been forwarded to the Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development for approval after incorporating the amendments submitted by the Department of National Budget. The concept paper is currently being processed for submission to the Cabinet of Ministers to obtain approval.

3. Preparing a Single Law for Children in Accordance with the Convention on the Rights of the Child

Necessary steps are currently being taken to formulate a single law to safeguard child rights in Sri Lanka, based on the Convention on the Rights of the Child and aligned with current needs.

2.2 Implementation of Development Programs

2.2.1. Development Division

Progress and Special Achievements

1. Multi- Sectoral National Action Plan (NAP) to Address Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV) in Sri Lanka 2024 –2028

This National Action Plan has been implemented since 20 December 2024. In relation to implementing this plan, a program to prioritize activities for the years 2025–2026 was conducted in 2025 with the involvement of line Ministries.

Further, workshops were conducted in all provinces to implement this multi-sectoral National Action Plan at provincial, district, and divisional levels. Moreover, initial steps have been taken to hold discussions with Donor Forums to secure funding for implementing this Action Plan. In addition, a computerized mechanism has been developed to review the progress of this plan, and provincial and district officials have been made aware of it. Plans have also been made to provide training to relevant officials in all ministries in the future.

2. Strategic Plan to Implement the National Policy on Gender Equality and Women Empowerment

The draft of the strategic action plan for implementing the National Policy on Gender Equality and Women Empowerment has now been completed. As the final step, the draft has been submitted to the relevant ministries for validation of the action plan.

3. Implementation of National Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security (UNSCR 1325)

This action plan has been prepared within the National Policy Framework of Sri Lanka, in line with the *United Nations Security Council Resolution 1325* on Women, Peace and Security and in compliance with international obligations, and Cabinet approved said plan was *launched* during the International Women's Day National celebration in 2023. Accordingly, special attention is given to ensuring the peace and security of women affected by conflicts and those in post-conflict settings in Sri Lanka, improving the living standards of women, and promoting gender equality.

So far, five main steering committee meetings have been held to monitor and coordinate all activities of the National Action Plan, along with three inter-agency coordination and evaluation committee meetings. In addition, a mid-year progress review was conducted, and a meeting of all stakeholders was convened to brief them, and 48% of progress has been achieved at the end of 2025.

4. Implementation of the Provisions of the Women Empowerment Act, No. 37 of 2024

At present, the relevant members and the Executive Director of the National Commission on Women have been appointed. The Cabinet Memorandum related to upgrading the Women's Bureau of Sri Lanka was submitted to the Cabinet of Ministers for approval and according to the Cabinet Decision No. CP/25/1052/819/011 dated 02 July 2025, it has been decided to further study the matter in consultation with all relevant stakeholders, including the General Treasury.

5. Establishing the Background for Drafting the Gender Budgeting Act

The main objective of drafting the Gender Budgeting Act is to ensure that a specific allocation for women is included in the budget approved by Parliament, and to identify such allocations through the analysis of annual budget. Discussions were held with the heads of the Department of Treasury Operations, the Department of National Planning, and the Department of National Budget to consider necessary amendments to the concept paper, and the final concept paper was prepared accordingly. In addition, a workshop was conducted this year to raise awareness among other relevant key officials of ministries on gender budgeting. The concept paper is currently being processed for submission to the Cabinet of Ministers to obtain approval.

6. Cost of Living Allowance for Children under Institutional Care or Guardianship and Street Children

A program named "ARTHA" was launched to provide a monthly allowance of Rs. 5,000.00 as a cost of living allowance for children in institutional care and guardianship, as well as street children in Sri Lanka, effective from 01 January 2025 until they reach the age of 18 years. Under this program, Rs. 2,000.00 is credited to the child's account, while Rs. 3,000.00 is provided to the institution guardian on behalf of the child. By December 2025, payments had been credited for 6,814 children. To ensure the effective implementation of this program, as well as for progress review and follow-up activities, a National-level steering committee has been established under the chairmanship of the Secretary to the Ministry.

7. Program to Provide Financial Assistance to Secure Housing Facilities to Low-Income Couples Reintegrated Subsequent to Institutional Care

A program was initiated this year to provide financial assistance of Rs. 1.00 million to construct stable and secure houses for young men and women who have had to delay marriage due to being institutionalized without a proper family background or other formal support systems. An allocation of Rs. 1,000.00 million was made under the annual budget estimates 2025 for this purpose. However, identifying beneficiaries who own land proved to be challenging. By the end of the year, seven beneficiaries had been referred to the Department of Development Finance for providing benefits.

8. Drafting the Compact Act on the Rights of the Child in Accordance with the Convention on the Rights of the Child

The objective is to formulate a single law to ensure children's rights in Sri Lanka, based on the Convention on the Rights of the Child and aligned with contemporary needs. At present, other child-related legislation has been reviewed, and a concept paper has been prepared and approved by the Cabinet of Ministers. In addition, an initial draft has been prepared by the Legal Draftsman. The draft has been further discussed with relevant stakeholders, and the proposals obtained have been forwarded to the Legal Draftsman for incorporation into the Compact Act.

9. Conducting Meetings of District Child and Women Development Committees

In the year 2025, provisions of Rs. 1.07 million for the 25 districts were released to hold quarterly committee meetings for having discussions on issues with all the stakeholders' providing services to children and women.

10. Establishing Forums at District and Divisional Levels to Prevent Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV) Against Women and Girls

Forums were further established in 2025 at district and divisional levels with the objectives of preventing gender-based violence, responding to it, collecting data and advocacy, coordination, and strengthening efforts. By the end of the year, 45 forums had been established at both divisional and district levels.

11. Program for the Prevention of Teenage Pregnancies

At present, due to the increase in reported cases of teenage pregnancies in Sri Lanka, awareness programs aimed at preventing teenage pregnancies were conducted for various target groups, including school children in 12 districts using local and foreign funding (from Save the Children) amounting to Rs. 1.255 million. The districts where these programs were implemented are Kalutara, Monaragala, Hambantota, Kegalle, Trincomalee, Ampara, Puttalam, Kilinochchi, Kurunegala, Batticaloa, Anuradhapura, and Ratnapura.

12. Media Publicity

Publicity campaigns such as news, interviews, newspaper supplements etc. have been carried out through electronic and print media to sensitize the society on the days assigned internationally for women and children. The contribution of the media was also made to sensitize the society about the programs, projects and activities launched by the Ministry for the empowerment and protection of women and the various programs implemented by the Ministry for handling the media in an ethical manner that would be favorable to women and children.

13. Providing Information/ Reports to other Ministries and Related Coordination Activities

As the 80th session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) was scheduled to be held in September, the necessary information for the High-Level General Debate was provided to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Furthermore, since the President of Sri Lanka was scheduled to deliver the Country Statement at the 80th General Debate, the required inputs for the statement, as well as relevant information needed by the Sri Lankan delegation for discussions during this session, were submitted to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Foreign Employment and Tourism.

As a high-level meeting of the United Nations General Assembly was held in New York to mark the 30th anniversary of the Fourth World Conference on Women, the required information was provided to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Foreign Employment and Tourism. In addition, through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Foreign Employment and Tourism, the necessary information relating to the List of Issues on Sri Lanka's initial report scheduled to be considered at upcoming sessions of the Committee on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities was submitted.

14. Program on Gender and Women's Rights - Programs Implemented by Utilizing the Provisions of United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA)

For the year 2025, a sum of Rs. 10.00 million was provided to this Ministry by the United Nations Population Fund to implement programs aimed at preventing gender-based violence and providing services to victims. During the implementation of these programs, allocations were also made for the Women's Bureau of Sri Lanka and the National Committee on Women. Out of the funds allocated for the Development Division, a progress of 95% has been achieved.

2.2.2. Planning and Information Technology Division

Progress and Special Achievements

1. Planning

Under the planning function, technical support was provided for the preparation of the Ministry's Annual Action Plan, District Action Plans, and the plan for the Organizational Results Framework, as well as other relevant plans related to the women and child sectors. Further, in line with the 43 priority areas assigned to this Ministry in accordance with the Government's new policy statement, an Action Plan 2025 and a Five-Year Strategic Plan for 2025–2029 have also been prepared. In addition, technical assistance has been provided for plans, policies and other periodic reports prepared by various Institutions/ Departments and other Ministries under the scope of this Ministry according to National and International policies and recommendations.

2. Monitoring

Quarterly progress reporting related to the Government's policy statement, progress reporting based on district plans, preparation and submission of the Progress Report and Performance Report. In addition, monthly, quarterly, and annual progress reporting for all development programs of the Ministry has been carried out, along with the holding of progress review meetings. Monthly progress reports on the budget proposals 2025, as well as special progress reports requested by the Presidential Secretariat have been submitted. Progress Report and Performance Report have prepared and submitted to the Parliament.

In addition, 02 quarterly joint progress review meetings were held with the Department of Project Management and Monitoring, and recommendations were provided. Furthermore, 02 progress review discussions were conducted regarding the duties and progress of provincial and district level officers relevant to this Ministry, during which necessary instructions and guidance were provided to the officers. One of these discussions was held via Zoom technology, while the other was conducted at the Sethsiripaya premises with the participation of 165 district level officers.

Furthermore, following Cyclonic Storm Ditwah, a Zoom discussion was held with the participation of 500 officers to provide necessary instructions and guidance to district and divisional level officers, as well as for follow-up activities.

3. Follow – Up

To encourage young women entrepreneurs, project loans were provided through the Ministry to young entrepreneurial women across all districts under a budget proposal submitted for the year 2023. In the Matara District, three Divisional Secretariat Divisions Thihagoda, Kirinda–Puhulwella, and Hakmana were selected, and income-generating projects of the beneficiaries under this project were monitored. Reports containing conclusions and recommendations were subsequently submitted.

In the Puttalam District, a follow-up field visit was conducted to several child-related projects in the Wanathavilluwa Divisional Secretariat Division, and reports were prepared and submitted.

4. Digitalization and Continuation of Information Technology Affairs

Digitization of state institutions has become a top priority of the Government in order to build a responsive public service that delivers transparent and efficient services to citizens. Accordingly, an allocation of Rs.30.00 million has been made for the digitalization of women and child affairs in 2025. For this purpose, information on methodologies for data collection, dissemination, and analysis was gathered and based on the suggestions and comments received, several discussions were held with the Ministry of Digital Economy, the Sri Lanka Computer Emergency Readiness Team, and other Technical Institutions. It is expected to develop a structured data system and a system for obtaining data and reports relating to the women and children sector.

In addition, the maintenance of the Ministry's official website, YouTube channel, and Facebook page has been assigned to this division, and the relevant platforms are updated based on information provided by the respective institutions. Furthermore, the provision of antivirus software for the Ministry, as well as internet operations and computer networking activities under the Lanka e-Government Network, have been properly maintained and managed.

Training workshops were conducted for the Ministry staff with the aim of updating the knowledge of officers in the field of Information and Communication Technology. In particular, approximately 11 computer training programs were conducted for officers from institutions engaged in the Ministry's development activities, covering topics such as Ministry's official website, official Facebook account, LGN and LAN, e-Commerce, Photoshop, MS Access (Advanced), and Cyber Security. A total of around 619 officers participated in these programs.

Moreover, in order to align with the current scope of digitalization of women and child affairs, opportunities were provided for staff to gain greater benefits through new training initiatives. Accordingly, training programs such as "Introduction to Essential Information and Communication Technology for Public Servants" and "Promoting Attitudinal Change among Public Servants through Modern Technology" were conducted. Furthermore, training on Cyber Security, the Data Protection Act, and the e-Government policy was provided, covering the majority of officers of the Ministry.

In order to prepare an Inventory of the information technology equipment and tools belonging to the Ministry, a mechanism has also been initiated to store the relevant information under a QR code.

5. Awareness programs

To strengthen gender-responsive disaster preparedness, an awareness program was conducted for field officers of the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs serving in the Matara District, and reports were submitted. Approximately 100 officers participated in this program. The second program was conducted for officers working in the women and child sector in the Kurunegala District, with the participation of 150 officers.

6. Project Coordination

The Food Security and Livelihood Development Recovery Emergency Assistance Project is coordinated by the Planning and Information Technology Division on behalf of the Ministry under which progress reporting, progress review meetings, representing to meetings organized by Department of National Planning and donor agency and relevant instructions and recommendations have been issued. This project was commenced in the year 2022 and will be implemented until August 2026. A sum of Rs.535.11 million have been allocated to implement programs for the development of women and children, and the

programs are implemented by the Development Division, Department of Probation and Child Care Services, National Secretariat for Early Childhood Development and the Women's Bureau of Sri Lanka.

The coordination and related activities pertaining to the implementation of other foreign-funded projects are carried out in coordination with other Ministries, as well as government and non-governmental organizations relevant to the subject of child and women development.

7. Maintaining the Internal Affairs Unit

Focusing on the importance of ensuring the integrity of public officers and creating a public service in Sri Lanka that is free from bribery and corruption and in line with the existing government policies in this regard, an Internal Affairs Unit (IAU) has been established within the Ministry. Its functions have been carried out continuously with the highest priority and with transparency. The responsibility of maintaining the Ministry's Internal Affairs Unit and carrying out its operational activities, in collaboration with other divisions/departments, and institutions on behalf of the Ministry, has been assigned to this division. Accordingly, several awareness and guidance sessions have been conducted. Through these, awareness among other officers has been enhanced by distributing informational leaflets, posters, and stickers.

8. Evaluation of Programs

The implementation of the National Evaluation Policy in Sri Lanka is the responsibility and duty of all government institutions. Accordingly, this division has taken initial steps required to conduct an evaluation of the School Child Protection Committees program implemented by the National Child Protection Authority. For this purpose, an allocation of Rs. 3.00 million has been provided to the Ministry under the expenditure head of the Department of Project Management and Monitoring.

2.2.3. National Secretariat for Early Childhood Development

Progress and Special Achievements

Programs/ Benefits for Pregnant and Lactating Mothers

1. Program to Provide a Nutrition Allowance of Rs. 45,000.00 to Pregnant and Lactating Mothers

Vouchers worth Rs. 45,000.00 are issued to mothers from families with nutritional deficiencies and health reasons or whose family income is less than the estimated average monthly expenditure of that family, to obtain the necessary nutritional food for the last 06 months of pregnancy and the first 04 months during lactation. A provision of Rs. 7,500.00 million had been allocated for this program, which covered all 25 districts in the year 2025, and its physical target was 200,000 pregnant mothers. A sum of Rs. 7,239.62 million has been spent for 171,647 pregnant mothers during the year 2025.

2. Program to Provide a One-Time Nutritional Food Package Worth Rs. 5,000.00

According to 2025 budget proposals, this program was implemented in December 2025 by the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs, in collaboration with the Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development, to provide a one-time nutritional food package worth Rs. 5,000.00 during the festive season to all pregnant mothers and lactating mothers (up to 4 months of age of the child) who were registered at government maternal clinics.

For the selection of beneficiaries for this program, with the support of the Ministry of Health and Mass Media, all pregnant and lactating mothers (up to 4 months of age of the child) who were registered at maternal clinics across the island by 30th November 2025, were selected. Accordingly, a Treasury allocation of Rs. 1,500.00 million was made for 240,000 pregnant and lactating mothers. As 31.12.2025, an expenditure of Rs. 898.06 million had been incurred for 179,612 pregnant and lactating mothers.

Programs / Benefits for Pre-school Teachers

3. Programs for Providing Monthly Allowance to Pre-school Teachers

The Guru Abhimani program, which provides a monthly allowance to pre-school teachers with the aim of appreciating the services of pre-school teachers and improving the quality of the sector, was implemented in the year 2025, covering all 25 districts. The allowance of Rs. 5,000.00 provided from January 2025 to 31 May 2025 was increased to Rs. 6,000.00 with effect from June 2025. Accordingly, the annual allocation for this program is Rs.1050.00 million and the annual target was 15,833 beneficiary teachers. The total expenditure incurred for 15,833 beneficiary teachers during the year 2025 is Rs. 1000.09 million.

4. Regulation and Supervision of Pre-School Teacher Training Diploma Institutions

With the aim of maintaining the quality of preschool teachers' service and producing preschool teachers equipped with sound knowledge, skills, and positive attitudes in relation to early childhood development and education, the regulation and supervision of preschool teacher training diploma institutions are carried out.

This is carried out under the leadership of the National Secretariat for Early Childhood Development with the participation of the Ministry of Education. Accordingly, applications were called for in 2025 for the registration of preschool teacher training diploma institutions. A total of 110 applications were received islandwide and following field inspections and interviews conducted in relation to these institutions, 75 preschool teacher training diploma institutions were identified as eligible for new registration.

Programs/ Benefits for Pre-school Children

5. Program for Providing Morning Meal for Children in Pre-schools/ Early Childhood Development Centers

With the objective of improving the nutritional status of underweight preschool children, this program was implemented in 2025 covering all 25 districts, including both estate and non-estate sectors. An amount of Rs. 100.00 per child per day was allocated for this program, with a total annual provision of Rs. 3,200.00 million. The annual target number of preschool children was 155,000. During the year 2025, the total expenditure incurred was Rs. 2,526.86 million for 151,872 preschool children across 7,835 estate and non-estate preschools.

Other Programs Implemented

6. National Coordinating Committee on Early Childhood Care and Development

The objective is to ensure the multi-sectoral collaboration from national to grassroot level in formulating and implementing plans and Early Childhood Care and Development work and taking decisions on Early Childhood Development at national level, while 03 meetings of the National Coordinating Committee were held during the year 2025 at a total cost of Rs. 0.18 million.

7. Five-Year Multi-Sectoral Action Plan for the Implementation of the National Policy on Early Childhood Care and Development (2018)

The five-year multi-sectoral action plan (2025-2029) for the implementation of the National Policy on Early Childhood Care and Development (2018) prepared involving all stakeholders, has been approved by the Cabinet of Ministers in October 2025.

8. Progress Review Meetings of Early Childhood Development Officers

This program has been implemented with the objectives of ensuring effective coordination between the National Secretariat for Early Childhood Development and officers at the regional level, reviewing the success of programs implemented at national/provincial/ divisional, and grassroots levels, and identifying issues arising in the performance of official duties and proposing solutions thereto. Accordingly, three (03) quarterly meetings have been held by the end of the year 2025.

9. Training program for Officers to Practically Implement the ‘Senehe Thataka’ Home-Based Early Childhood Care and Development Program

With the objective of ensuring the holistic development of the child by enhancing the awareness of parents and caretakers on early childhood development and care, a training program for Early Childhood Development Officers was implemented for the practical execution of the ‘Senehe Thataka’ home-based Early Childhood Care and Development Program. This program was conducted covering all 25 districts under UNICEF funding.

10. Awareness Program on Good Parenting and Early Childhood Development for Parents, Preschool Teachers, and the Community

With the objective of enhancing awareness and developing positive attitudes among parents and caretakers on early childhood development and care, and thereby enabling them to become responsive parents/caretakers, this program was implemented covering all 25 districts. For this purpose, an allocation of Rs. 5.37 million was made, out of which an expenditure of Rs. 5.06 million was incurred during the year 2025.

11. National Week on Early Childhood Care and Development

With the primary objective of raising public awareness on the necessity and importance of accessing quality services related to early childhood care and development, programs aimed at the protection, care, and development of children in early childhood are conducted annually from 14th to 20th July. These programs are organized by bringing together all stakeholders responsible for the subject of early childhood and are implemented at national, provincial, district, and divisional levels. The following seven programs were implemented during the National Week on Early Childhood Development and Care in 2025 under the theme “*PUNCHI APATA LOWA DINANNA- SELLAMATATH IDAK DENNA*”.

12. Training Program for Early Childhood Development Officers

With the objective of enhancing efficiency and ensuring the prompt performance of duties, as well as updating knowledge, training programs were conducted in 2025 for ninety-three Early Childhood Development Officers attached to all Divisional Secretariat Divisions since 2014.

13. Program for Developing a Child-Friendly Environment for Child Development Centers and Receiving Centers

This program was implemented in collaboration with the Department of Prisons with the primary objective of ensuring the overall quality development of children in care by improving both the physical environment and childcare practices. Accordingly, efforts were made to create a physically stimulating and developmentally supportive environment for children in early childhood residing in the care center at Welikada Prison, to provide caretakers with basic knowledge on early childhood development and training on appropriate childcare practices, and to enhance physical facilities and human resource capacity. An allocation of Rs. 3.02 million was made for this purpose, of which Rs. 2.45 million was spent during the year 2025.

14. Early Childhood Care and Development Activities during Emergency Disaster Situations

This program was implemented with the objective of ensuring the survival, growth, and development of all children in early childhood in Sri Lanka by maintaining Early Childhood Development Centers as safe and supportive environments at all times, with the support of a comprehensive and integrated Early Childhood Care and Development service system.

During the year 2025, in response to the emergency disaster situation caused by Ditwah cyclone, programs were implemented with the participation of Early Childhood Development Officers and Early Childhood Development Centers/Preschool teachers. These programs were activity-based and conducted in care centers, with the aim of enhancing the psychosocial well-being of affected children.

15. World Children's Day Program

In parallel with the series of programs conducted to mark World Children's Day, awareness programs for preschool teachers were implemented across all 25 districts under the theme "The Role of Preschool Teachers in Safeguarding Children's Rights." Accordingly, as of 31.12.2025, a total expenditure of Rs. 1.55 million had been incurred.

16. Program for the Promotion of Short Videos and Posts on Early Childhood Care and Development through Facebook Page and YouTube Channel

The National Secretariat for Early Childhood Development maintains an official Face Book page (NSECD Face Book) and operates a YouTube channel (NSECD YouTube Channel). Under this, posts, videos and advertisements related to early childhood care and development have been released on social media.

17. Program for Raising Awareness and Empowering Rural Committee Members on the Provision of Early Childhood Care and Development Services

Under this program, all institutions and officers affiliated with the child affairs sector, representing the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs, collectively work towards establishing one rural committee per Grama Niladhari Division and maintaining them at an operational level. Accordingly, awareness-raising and empowerment of Rural Child Development Committee members are carried out.

Through this program, committee members are equipped with the necessary knowledge to identify vulnerable children in areas such as access to development opportunities, health and nutrition, care, and protection, and to make necessary interventions. Furthermore, by empowering these rural committee members, efforts have been made to create a safe family and social environment for children.

18. Food Security and Livelihood Recovery Emergency Assistance Project (ADB)

This program was implemented with the objective of early identification of most vulnerable and disadvantaged children in early childhood and referring them to the required services, as well as enhancing the capacity of Early Childhood Development Officers to prepare care plans in coordination with Child Rights Promotion Officers in order to protect children in early childhood who are exposed to vulnerable conditions.

For this purpose, under the Food Security and Livelihood Recovery Emergency Assistance Project, a total provision of Rs. 4.00 million was made for nine (09) provincial-level training programs. During the year 2025, eight (08) such training programs were conducted at the provincial level, with an expenditure of Rs. 2.40 million incurred to train 307 Early Childhood Development Officers.

2.2.4. National Child Protection Authority

Progress and Special Achievements

Key Functions

National Child Protection Authority entrusted with a broad mandate in accordance with the National Child Protection Authority Act. To develop legal, administrative or other reforms necessary for the effective implementation of the national policy on child protection, to receive complaints of child abuse from the public, which includes investigating, operating and maintaining, supervising the process of child abuse cases involving children and providing assistance, supervision and follow-up to children in conflict with the law, and to develop and monitor minimum standards for the provision of child protection services and facilities.

Also, the main functions include developing and conducting national programs with the objectives of preventing child abuse and responding to child victims of abuse for the best interests of the child, educating children, youth, professionals and the public, providing information and education, and conduct stakeholder meetings, workshops, discussions and forums on child protection and child development to promote child abuse prevention methods and child protection knowledge to ensure the safety of children from all forms of abuse.

Officers have been attached at the District and Divisional Secretariat levels to perform the functions of the Authority. They attend to tasks assigned by the Authority as well as to matters that are directly reported to them.

Main Development Programs Implemented

1. Advocacy on the National Child Protection Policy and Awareness-raising for Government Officials at District and Divisional levels.

Awareness-raising for government officials regarding the National Child Protection Policy was also carried out this year. In this process, workshops were conducted at the district level for professionals related to the ten stakeholder sectors responsible for implementing the National Child Protection Policy. These sectors include: justice and law reforms, education, defence and law enforcement, health, social development, labour and employment, tourism, media and information technology, women and child affairs, and disaster management. This program was implemented with the contribution of officers from the resource pool. In the year 2025, a total of 44 programs were conducted, reaching 2,695 beneficiaries.

2. Island-wide Program to Implement Community-based Initiatives Aimed at Strengthening Child Protection at the Grassroots Level

The objective is to empower communities within Divisional Secretariat divisions to enhance child protection, and through this, initiate a process where communities themselves create a safer and more suitable environment for children. This also aims to establish an active community network for child protection (Child Protection Advocacy Network). In the year 2025, a total of 277 programs were conducted, reaching 53,849 beneficiaries.

3. Establishment and Activation of School Child Protection Committees (SURAKUM PAWWA)

The main objectives are to ensure the right to compulsory education and to take appropriate measures to prevent children from abuse. This includes establishing School Child Protection Committees in schools, increasing the sensitivity of education authorities regarding child protection, obtaining their maximum support to create active child protection committees in schools, and implementing various programs throughout the year to strengthen these committees. In the year 2025, a total of 37 awareness programs were conducted for education authorities, reaching 2,501 beneficiaries.

4. “Student Ambassador” National Program on Child Protection for the Prefects of the Schools and “University Student Ambassador”: National Program on Child Protection for University Students

The objective of this program is to develop knowledge, skills and attitudes of the senior prefects and university students about child protection. Under this program the assistance of the prefects is obtained to reduce child abuse in schools and the school community is educated on child protection. In the year 2025, a total of 246 schools representing all 25 districts were registered. One training program was conducted for the resource pool, with 38 participants receiving training. Additionally, 25 principal training programs and 25 district-level training programs were conducted.

In 2025, the National Child Protection Authority, in collaboration with the University Grants Commission, registered 998 university students from 17 state universities as University Student Ambassadors. One training program was conducted for the resource pool, with 95 participants trained. In addition, five training programs were conducted, and a total of 740 participants received training.

5. Monitoring of Religious and Charitable institutions that Provide Child Care Services and Supervision of Centers Providing Child Day-Care Facilities

In accordance with Section 14 of the National Child Protection Authority Act, the main objectives of these programs are to supervise and monitor all religious and charitable institutions that provide child care services, as well as child development centers. Additionally, provisions are implemented to monitor centers providing child day-care facilities in line with the National Policy and National Guidelines on Child Day Care Facilities in Sri Lanka. In the year 2025, a total of 334 voluntary child development centers were supervised and monitored. Furthermore, 178 child day-care centers were also supervised and monitored during the same year.

6. National Program to Raise Awareness on Child Protection among Teachers, Students and Staff Members of National Colleges of Education

The main objective is to build a knowledgeable and sensitive community of teachers and staff regarding child protection, thereby creating a generation of children who are safe, happy, and educated in child-friendly school environments. In 2025, a total of 08 programs were conducted in 08 National Colleges of Education. Through these programs, a total of 3,001 beneficiaries were educated.

7. National Program to Raise Awareness on Child Protection among Nursing Officers in Nursing Training Schools under the Ministry of Health

The main objective is to develop a group of nursing officers who are sensitive to child protection, ensuring that all healthcare interventions involving children are carried out in the best interests of the child. In the year 2025, three (03) programs were conducted, reaching a total of 610 beneficiaries.

8. Media and Communication Programs on Child Protection

The main objective is to provide information and education to improve the knowledge, skills, and attitudes of school communities, parents, professionals, adults, and the general public regarding child rights and child protection. In 2025, resource contribution was provided for 29 television and radio programs. Six (06) press releases were issued. One (01) awareness program was conducted for journalists on ethical reporting of child abuse, along with two (02) awareness programs on child protection. In addition, eight (08) exhibitions and mobile service programs were conducted. Information was also provided to 38 individuals who visited the National Child Protection Authority to obtain relevant details.

9. “Sithuwili Siththam” All-Island Art, Poster, and Cartoon Competition

The main objective is to raise awareness and interest among children regarding prevention from child abuse and child rights. In line with World Children’s Day 2025, the National Child Protection Authority organized the “SITHTHUWILI SITHTHAM 2025” All-Island Art, Poster, and Cartoon Competition based on the themes of children’s rights and child protection. According to the final judging process, a total of 678 winners were selected, including 56 national-level winners and 622 district-level winners. The “SITHTHUWILI SITHTHAM” district programs were conducted in 25 districts. The names of the winners have been published on the website of the National Child Protection Authority. (www.childprotection.gov.lk).

10. Conducting Special Investigations, Monitoring Investigations and Criminal Cases and Judicial Proceedings

The prime objective of this is to provide legal assistance to children who are victims of child abuse. Accordingly, in the year 2025, the Special Police Investigation Unit of the National Child Protection Authority has had 1,663 court appearances. (High Court: 971, Magistrate’s Court: 692) The Legal Division of the National Child Protection Authority has made 08 appearances before the court. The National Child Protection Authority has received 206 complaints of cyber surveillance through visits to the Authority and via telephone.

11. Establishment and Maintenance of Child-friendly Video Evidence Recording Units, Provision of Support for Children Whose Rights have been Violated, and Training of Officers

The primary aim of this program is to prevent children who have already experienced abuse from being re-victimized. In 2025, a new video evidence recording unit was established in the Anuradhapura District. During the same year, 196 video evidence recordings were completed. A total of 251 video recordings were released based on court orders and directives of the Attorney General. Additionally, 71 court appearances were made. Furthermore, 247 typed transcript copies were released in accordance with court orders and Attorney General’s instructions.

12. Operation and Maintenance of the Child Helpline (1929)

The main objective is to receive public complaints related to child abuse. Through this service, complaints related to physical, psychological, and sexual abuse, as well as neglect, are received 24 hours a day. In 2025, a total of 8,235 complaints were received through the 1929 Child Helpline. Further, 29,475 calls have been received through the 1929 Child Helpline during the year.

13. National Child Centered Psychosocial Support Service

The primary objectives of this service are to enhance the quality of services provided in the best interests of children, to identify the psychological conditions of abused children and refer

them to psycho-social support services, and to improve their mental well-being. In the year 2025, a total of 684 psycho-social support and coordination have been carried out. Psycho-social support and interventions were provided to 226 children. A total of 285 follow-ups of complaints have been done. The number of complaints concluded after providing psycho-social interventions was 3,409. In addition, 193 instances of psychotherapy and psychological counselling were provided for children. Fifty-one (51) case conferences have been conducted. Seven (7) court appearances were made to prepare children psychologically in advance for video evidence recordings.

14. Conducting training programs related to psycho-social interventions

The primary objectives of this initiative are to create a safe and child-friendly environment for children, to update the knowledge of child protection professionals, and to encourage the practical application of the knowledge gained through training programs within their professional practice. In the year 2025, two (02) training programs were conducted.

15. Special Community Program Implemented to Ensure the Well-Being of Children Living in Plantation Sectors

The primary objective of this program is to create a plantation community network that actively works towards child protection. In the year 2025, nine (09) programs were conducted and the number of beneficiaries was 461. In addition, two (02) special projects were implemented while the number of beneficiaries was 26.

16. Community-based program implemented to enhance the protection and well-being of children living in coastal villages

The primary objective of this program is to establish an active community network in coastal areas for child protection. In the year 2025, twelve (12) community awareness programs were conducted, and the number of total beneficiaries was 581.

17. National Awareness Program on Child Protection for Drivers and Assistants Transporting School Children

The objective of this program is to prevent child abuse in transportation services by empowering drivers and assistants transporting school children to ensure child protection and well-being. This program was launched in the year 2025. A total of 12 programs were conducted, benefiting 327 participants.

18. Awareness program on Child Protection for Medical Officers Studying at the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine

The primary objective of this program is to train medical officers studying at the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine to become sensitized professionals in relation to child protection, thereby ensuring that interventions in the health sector concerning children are carried out in the best interests of the child. In the year 2025, three (03) awareness programs on child protection were conducted for medical officers studying at the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine.

2.2.5 Women's Bureau of Sri Lanka

Progress and Special Achievements

Main Development Programs Implemented

1. Women's Economic Empowerment Development Program

Entrepreneurship development programs are implemented representing the identified sectors in order to economically empower women. For this purpose, programs are implemented based on provisions of the Government of Sri Lanka, as well as programs implemented by various international development partners.

2. Entrepreneurship Development

Women are economically empowered, including those who engage in entrepreneurship projects based on knowledge and skills, as well as urban low-income women, women engaged in the fisheries sector, estate-sector women, women intending to migrate for employment, women who have lost social protection due to special sensitivity, women affected in families of long-term prisoners, rural women impacted by unregulated microfinance loan schemes, and women from female-headed households.

Under the program implemented in 2025, a total of 666 projects have been implemented, with an allocated sum of Rs. 59.50 million. Of these, 488 are individual projects, while 190 are group projects. Accordingly, 5,302 women have benefited under this program.

3. Market Promotion for Women Entrepreneurs

Providing access to market opportunities is a key requirement for women empowered through entrepreneurship development. For this purpose, several major programs are implemented under the provisions of the Government of Sri Lanka. Among these, a key program is the recognition of women who have achieved success as entrepreneurs at regional, district, and national levels.

In addition, exhibitions and market opportunities are created to facilitate these women entrepreneurs' access to both local and international markets. An initiative in this regard is the "Liya Shakthi" women's product exhibition and trade fair, organized at the national level in parallel with International Women's Day. Furthermore, arrangements have been made to conduct market events covering all districts.

Providing canopy huts to Divisional Secretariats for organizing women entrepreneurs into groups and enabling them to conduct trade fairs is also a project implemented under this program.

Providing mobile trade stalls for women engaged in informal trading is another project implemented to promote market opportunities. A special feature of the "LIYA SHAKTHI" National Women's Product Exhibition and Trade Fair, held in parallel with International Women's Day, was the support provided by the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and the United Nations Development Program (UNDP).

4. Enhancing the Knowledge, Attitudes, and Skills of Women Entrepreneurs

In empowering low-income and socially and economically affected women as entrepreneurs, it has been identified as a key need to develop knowledge and skills related to entrepreneurship, as well as to provide awareness on financial literacy in particular.

Accordingly, under the Annual Action Plan, provisions are made for the “Motivational Training Program for Income Generation.” An amount of Rs.1.20 million has been allocated for this purpose. A provision of Rs. 25,000.00 is allocated per program, and entrepreneurship knowledge, skills, and attitudes are developed for a minimum group of 40 beneficiaries per program.

The technical assistance for this is provided by institutions such as the Small Enterprise Development Division, the Industrial Development Board, the Vidatha Resource Centre, and the Ministry of Industry and Entrepreneurship Development. In 2025, 49 programs were conducted at the district level, with the objective of educating 1,960 beneficiaries.

All loan programs implemented with the objective of strengthening the economic capacity of rural women (such as the revolving loan program, economic empowerment of widowed and female-headed households, alternative income generation for women intending to migrate for employment, livestock development programs, “DIRIYA MANPETHA” and similar initiatives) are accessible only after successfully completing the Motivational Training Program for Income Generation.

Twenty-eight (28) programs have been conducted as at 30.09.2025 and 1,198 beneficiaries have been educated. An expenditure of Rs. 700,000.00 has been incurred for this purpose.

Furthermore, under the Annual Action Plan, a training program at National Vocational Qualification (NVQ) level in nursing and food production is conducted for girls above the age of 18 before socialization from Child Development Centers. This is implemented as a public–private partnership project. The Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission (TVEC) provides technical training, while the institution provides employment opportunities for the trained beneficiaries.

A program titled “DIVIYATA ARUTHAK” is being implemented for the economic and social empowerment of women who have lost social sensitivity due to special circumstances. This

entrepreneurship program is implemented based on requests made by women affected by gender-based violence or by other parties.

Under this program, interventions are made with the aim of strengthening the livelihoods of households where husbands have been imprisoned for long periods, as well as preventing the reimprisonment of women who have been released after being imprisoned for minor offences.

5. Market Promotion and Women's Product Exhibition and Trade Fair

Women, despite facing various challenges, often encounter multiple economic and social issues within the family context. In overcoming such circumstances, this program has been implemented to identify women engaged in entrepreneurship who strive to operate businesses by providing products and services. It aims to improve the quality of their products and services, introduce market opportunities, expand market access, and promote digital marketing, thereby enhancing their economic status and creating a conducive family environment that supports the improvement of their social well-being.

Accordingly, covering 11 districts, Rs. 877,571.00 from the Ministry allocations was utilized to provide market opportunities for 563 women entrepreneurs.

6. Counselling Program

The objective of this program is to minimize community-level impacts on groups experiencing poor mental health conditions, provide standardized counselling services through innovation in counselling practices, strengthen coordination among stakeholders in the counselling field, and establish guidelines for monitoring service delivery.

Accordingly, Counselling Officers and Counselling Assistants provide services at district and divisional secretariat levels. In addition, 12 special centers have been established to implement counselling services. These service centers are operating in Anuradhapura, Monaragala, Nugathalawa, Ratnapura, Katunayake (Free Trade Zone), Kegalle, Matara, Galle, Gampaha, Kalutara, and Colombo (Counselling Units).

Awareness programs are conducted to address the social difficulties faced by women subjected to gender-based violence, with the aim of overcoming such challenges. Under this initiative, approximately 1,410 clients have been educated in this regard.

7. Temporary Shelters for Women

With the aim of ensuring the protection and rights of women subjected to gender-based violence, 11 shelters for women are maintained across the country.

The primary objective is to respond to sexual and gender-based violence against women in Sri Lanka by improving comprehensive shelter services, including protection, rehabilitation,

independence, and empowerment of affected women, as well as strengthening support services provided for them.

Services provided to victimized women and their children, as well as the vulnerable community, include:

- Immediate relief and shelter support
- Protection and a safe environment
- Treatment, rehabilitation, and counseling services
- Referral services
- Vocational training for social reintegration
- Follow-up support

At present, 11 shelters are in operation across 10 districts for this purpose. Of these, 02 centers are directly funded by the Ministry, while the remaining shelters are maintained with the support of non-governmental organizations (NGOs).

During the year 2025, services were provided to 668 women, and the total expenditure incurred to date amounts to Rs. 17.49 million.

8. National Center for Widows and Female Heads of Households – Kilinochchi

This center, established on 13.11.2015 for the welfare of widows and female heads of households, provides technical training for women. For income generation projects such as palmyrah products, sewing projects, decorative items, cattle farming, goat farming, etc., along with necessary training and support.

A provision of Rs.2.00 million has been spent in the year 2025 to implement 12 programs for empowering female heads of households.

International Day Celebrations

The Women's Bureau of Sri Lanka annually celebrates two international days. It serves as the national focal institution for celebrating "International Women's Day" and also participates as a partner in the celebration of "World Mental Health Day."

9. National Celebration of International Women's Day

In line with International Women's Day, Sri Lanka conducts the "National Celebration Program for International Women's Day." This year, it was organized under the theme "Strong she will be a pathway to build a sustainable future", in collaboration with all institutions under the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs.

The National Celebration of International Women's Day for the year 2025 was declared as "National Women's Week – 2025" in accordance with the Cabinet decision dated 26th February 2025, and was held from 02nd March 2025 to 08th March 2025.

Accordingly, program was implemented covering the entire island, in collaboration with various Ministries, departments, and institutions, and focused through District and Divisional Secretariats.

10. Mental Health Day

The World Health Organization (WHO) has designated October 10 of every year as World Mental Health Day. The theme for 2025 is “Community: Supporting Mental Well-being Together.” In line with this, programs were conducted at the national, district, and regional levels.

11. Building the Network of Women’s Societies

To empower women economically and socially, Women's Action Societies are established at the Grama Niladhari Division level gathering all women over 18 years. Regional Women's Federations are established at the Divisional Secretary level with the participation of these women officers. District Women Federations are established involving women officers in all 25 districts to unite women at the district level. This network enables the entire women's community to contribute to the country's development and implements development programs conducted by the Women's Bureau of Sri Lanka. The active women's societies are as follows:

- No. of Women Action Societies (GN Level) -12,994
- No. of Divisional Women Federations (Divisional Level) - 317
- No. of District Women Federations (District Level) - 25

Projects Implemented with Foreign Funded

12. Economic Empowerment of Women through Entrepreneurship, Leadership and Networking

Projects for reorganizing Women Action societies and empowering women entrepreneurs are being implemented in Ampara and Monaragala districts through JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency) for the economic empowerment of women through entrepreneurship, leadership and networking. JICA directly bears the project expenses. The project period is 2023-2027.

Under the women's economic empowerment component, 09 women entrepreneurs from each district, totaling 18, were selected, and procurement activities for providing goods and equipment to them are currently underway.

Additionally, under the Women Action Societies Activation component, of this project 56 awareness programs have been conducted to socially empower the members of Women Action Societies. Furthermore, activities such as amending the Constitution of Women Action Societies and preparing the cabinet paper for establishing the National Federation are in their final stages.

13. Empowerment of Sustainable Community-Based Families in Nuwara Eliya District- Saemaul

The Memorandum of Understanding was signed with Saemaul Global Foundation in the inauguration ceremony held on 25 August 2023, and renovations have been made to Shanthipura School. Agricultural training for 60 farmers was planned at Bindunuwewa Agricultural Center. Re-tendering has been done for modernizing the Saemaul vegetable collection center at Bambarakele in Nuwara Eliya district. This project is implemented for the period 2022-2026. The donor agency incurs the expenditure directly.

14. Food Security and Livelihood Development Emergency Assistance Project - Asian Development Bank- ADB

This implements vocational and capacity development programs and livelihood development programs for low-income women. The ADB (Asian Development Bank) has spent Rs. 10.76 million thereon, and it is implemented for the period 2022-2026.

15. Projects on Ensuring the Women's Rights – UNFPA (United Nations Population Fund)

This project is implemented based on annual allocations. Activities carried out under this program include: Payment of bills for 42 CDMA telephones provided to shelters for women, conducting capacity-building training programs for Women Development Officers, carrying out field inspections of shelters. The financial progress recorded under this project amounts to Rs. 0.29 million.

16. Programs Implemented Jointly with UN Women - 2024-2025

Under the implementation of National Action Plan on Women, Peace and Security, four (04) projects are being implemented jointly by UN Women and the Women's Bureau of Sri Lanka from March 2024 to March 2025. A total of 500 women entrepreneurs has been empowered, with 43 women entrepreneurs selected from each Divisional Secretariat Division.

This project was implemented under Korean aid to address the women most affected by the socio-economic crisis in the Ella/ Hali-Ela/ Bandarawela Divisional Secretariat Divisions in the Badulla District.

17. United Nations Development Program (UNDP)

Under this, action was taken to raise awareness among district and divisional committee members on the National Guideline for the Management of Shelters for Women. Except for the Matara District, awareness programs have now been conducted for committees in all other districts where shelters for women are established.

2.2.6. National Committee on Women

Progress and Special Achievements

Key Functions

The key function of the National Committee on Women that established with the aim of creating a violence-free, women-friendly Sri Lankan society that ensures equality is making recommendations and providing assistance for the formulation of policies and legislation that safeguard and promote the rights of Sri Lankan women, ensure equality and contribute to their comprehensive development and stimulating the proper implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of the same. Accordingly, the National Committee on Women operates a complaint center and the 1938 toll-free women's helpline service that provides necessary services 24 hours a day. These services provide legal advice, counseling and refer complainants to relevant institutions and call for reports. Also, timely follow-up of the complaints received is also a key function of the National Committee on Women.

Main Development Programs Implemented

1. Awareness Program on Cyber Violence, Harassment in Public Transport and Reproductive Health for Students in Higher Education Institutions

The objective is to prevent harassment of teenagers in public transport and on the internet and to improve knowledge, skills and attitudes in order to overcome the challenges they face during adolescence. Five (05) programs were conducted in the Gampaha, Hambanthota, Ratnapura, Kilinochchi and Colombo districts and a sum of Rs. 0.47 million has been spent to implement these programs.

2. Implementation of Pre-marital Counseling Programs for Marriage Intended Young Community (for a Happy Family Life)

Providing counselling services necessary to lead a successful family life by minimizing family disputes after marriage is the objective of the program.

In 2024, nine programs (09) were conducted in the districts of Jaffna, Badulla, Puttalam, Gampaha, Colombo, Kegalle, Galle and Kalutara and Rs.0.79 million has been spent on implementing those programs.

3. Empowerment of Marriage Registrars and Counseling Officers/ Counseling Assistants to Provide Pre-marital Counseling to Marriage Intended Young Community

In order to prevent domestic violence after marriage and to live a successful married life by facing the challenges therein, it is very appropriate for a couple who are expecting to get married with an understanding of a successful family life, and pre-marital counseling will be a better solution for that.

Accordingly, this program is expected to empower, coordinate and create coordination between counseling officers/counseling assistants and marriage registrars to provide pre-marital counseling to marriage intended young couples who come to the marriage registrars to give the Notice of Marriage before registration of the marriage.

It has been implemented in 12 districts namely Badulla, Galle, Matale, Batticaloa, Mannar, Kilinochchi, Vavuniya, Mullaitivu, Puttalam, Nuwara Eliya, Polonnaruwa and Trincomalee. A sum of Rs. 1.03 million has been spent for this purpose.

4. Conducting Programs at Workplaces to Raise Staff Awareness, Develop Attitudes, and Enhance Knowledge on Legal Aspects Related to the Prevention of Violence Against Women and Children

The objective of this program is to raise awareness on minimizing violence against women in workplaces. Six (06) programs have been conducted in the Colombo, Gampaha, and Galle districts. An amount of Rs. 0.19 million has been spent for this purpose.

5. Marking the International Women's Day, a Program on Gender Equality, Prevention of Gender-Based Violence and the Promotion of Mental Health, Conducted for Undergraduates Enrolled in General and Special Degree Programs of the Department of Social Sciences, Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities, at Rajarata University

The objective of this program is to raise awareness among university students on gender equality, prevent violence against gender-related issues, and protect women and children from cybercrime. The program has been successfully conducted at Rajarata University in the Anuradhapura District. An amount of Rs. 0.49 million has been spent on this program.

6. Provincial-Level Leadership Training Workshops on Empowering Women in Politics

The objectives of this program are to develop women leaders equipped with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes required to enter politics, and to encourage women in politics. Five (05) programs have been conducted in the Kandy, Kurunegala, Anuradhapura, Matara, and Colombo districts and a total of Rs. 12 million has been spent to conduct these programs.

7. Awareness and Counselling Programs on the Prevention of Gender Based Violence and Child Protection for Estate Welfare Officers

The objective is to educate estate welfare officers about gender-based violence and children's rights and protection in order to build a better standard of living and a satisfying work environment for the estate community. Accordingly, this program was held in the Nuwara Eliya District and an amount of Rs. 0.15 million was spent on the program.

8. Awareness Program on Prevention of Gender-Based Violence and Domestic Violence Act for Officers in Workplaces

Educating the community about the Domestic Violence Act, minimizing violence against women in the workplace, creating a peaceful environment in the family by minimizing domestic violence, and increasing the employee productivity are expected the objectives of this program. Five (05) programs have been conducted in the Colombo District and Rs.0.43 million has been spent.

9. Raising Awareness among University Students as an Approach to Enhance Women's Participation and Representation in Decision-Making Positions in Workplaces and in the Political Sphere.

The primary objective is to increase women's participation in the political sphere as well as in decision-making levels within both government and private sector institutions. Two (02) programs were conducted at the Universities of Peradeniya and Ruhuna for this purpose, at a total cost of Rs. 0.27 million.

10. International 16 Day Program for the Prevention of Violence Against Women

Every year, programs are organized and conducted for a period of 16 days from 25 November to 10 December that called International 16 Days to end all violence against women. The National Committee on Women has conducted many programs in the year 2025 as well.

The inaugural ceremony of the International 16 Day program was held in Colombo using foreign funds (UNFPA) amounting to Rs. 0.31 million.

Also, in parallel with the International 16 Day program, awareness programs on pre-marital counseling, awareness programs on the prevention of cybercrimes for students pursuing higher education, and awareness programs to minimize harassment in the workplace were held at a cost of Rs. 0.35 million.

11. Intervention to Prevent Gender-Based Violence

The 1938 –Toll Free Helpline for Women and Complaints Centre are operated for 24 hours every day in all three languages with the aim of performing the functions of the National Committee on Women more effectively and productively. As of 31 December 2025, a number of 2251 complaints have been received to the 1938 Helpline for Women and 476 complaints have been received to the Complaint Center.

12. Foreign Grants- (SAARC Development Fund) Project to Strengthen Toll-Free Helpline for Women and Children in SAARC Member States

This project is funded by the SAARC Development Fund. The project period is from 2nd August 2024 to 1st August 2025. Financial progress of the year 2025 is USD 24,176. A sum of USD 152,607 has been provided for the years 2025/2026 and the main activities thereof are as follows.

- Establish a call center operating for 24-hours and a mechanism for intervention.
- Building institutional capacity.
- Raising awareness among both the government and private sectors regarding the 1938 Helpline Service for Women and the 1929 Helpline Service for Children, as well as related subject areas.
- Developing and publishing counselling materials to enhance public awareness of the 1938 Helpline Service for Women and the 1929 Helpline Service for Children.

Activities will be carried out island wide under the following sub-activities of the said action plan.

- Five (05) Awareness programs have been conducted for the Ministry and district level (key officials) about 1938 Helpline for Women, gender and related subjects.
- Conducting mobile services at the district level has already been planned.
- Awareness programs on the 1938 Helpline Service for District/Divisional Secretariat level Counseling Officers and stakeholders (other officers). So far, four (04) awareness programs have been conducted.
- Making aware of police officers about the complaints received at the 1938 Helpline and Complaints Center, conducting programs to build cooperation between Ministry officials and Police Officers. So far, four (04) awareness programs have been conducted for this purpose.
- Conducted one (01) program to raise awareness on cybercrime in sign language for those in selected Centers for the Deaf and Dumb.
- Private sector (investment zones and other private companies/garments) institutions have been made aware of the 1938 helpline service, reproductive health, prevention of sexually transmitted diseases/ HIV in the workplace, violence against women in the workplace, prevention of domestic violence. So far, eleven (11) awareness programs have been conducted.
- Planned to carry out Bus labeling, Printing of Advertising Materials on 1938 Helpline Service.
- Installation of promotional display boards on the 1938 and 1929 helpline services within bus stands/stops is currently in progress. In addition, two video clips relating to child protection have been produced.
- Procurement process is at the final stage to strengthen the Data Management System of the Call Center operating for 24-hours.
- Under the Capacity development of officers, 30 officers have participated in two (02) training programs so far. Thirteen (13) officers have been directed to follow diplomas in Law and Counselling.
- Assistance to women victims - Assistance has been provided to 600 women in the Mannar district while concurrent activities are being carried out under this.
- A training program was conducted in the Gampaha District to build the capacity of officers on case management related to issues reported by service recipients through the 1938 toll-free helpline service.

Seventeen (17) positions at tertiary level have been approved, and 04 positions remain vacant. The existing vacancies consist of 01 position of Translator (Sinhala/Tamil), 02 positions of Counselling Officer, and 01 position of Information and Communication Technology Officer.

Considering the number of officers in the service category of secondary level, 963 officer positions have been approved, and currently 937 officers are serving in those approved positions. Accordingly, there are 26 vacancies. These vacancies consist of 04 positions in the Development Officers' Service, 01 position of Woman Development Officer (Departmental), 09 positions of Management Service Officer, 01 position of Woman Development Field Assistant, 05 positions of Hostel Warden, 05 positions of Assistant Hostel Warden, and 01 position of Information and Communication Technology Assistant.
